

"A Home of My Own" Focuses on Community Living Skills

"A Home of My Own" team members work with people with disabilities everyday to help them become as independent as possible, to live safely in their home and community and to enjoy living in their own homes. Each person focuses on different community living skills which are described in their Individual Support Plans (ISP) and for some people, Behavior Support Plans. The following are community living skills that everyone needs to master to become as independent as possible:

Household Management

Cleaning, laundry and basic maintenance/repairs

Healthy Eating

Learning what are healthy foods
Understanding what foods are on special diets (gluten free, low cholesterol, etc.)
Planning a weekly menu
Preparing a shopping list
Shopping by using coupons and reading about store specials
Reading/following a picture recipe
Preparing and enjoying a meal

Money Management

Budgeting, writing checks and paying bills

Social Skills

Developing and using appropriate social skills at work, at home and in the community

Health Care Management

Understanding health issues/history Knowing your medications Knowing your physicians Making medical/dental appointments Filling/refilling prescriptions

Academic Skills

Functional reading (recipes) and functional math (paying bills)

Fostering Self-Determination

Problem solving, making choices and self-advocacy

Healthy Lifestyles

Meeting and making friends
Maintaining friendships and family relationships
Dating
Fitness/recreation

Safety procedures in the home
What to do in an emergency at home
Reporting unsafe conditions to your family, staff or landlord
Exiting during unsafe conditions, including a fire or tornado
How to be safe when in the community, including anti-victimization and safely carrying money and identification
Safely using assistive technology, the internet and social media
